Jargon You Probably Never Heard Before Corner

California Train – A caravan of vehicles driven by Ham Radio Operators for the purpose of entering a contest as MOBILE and making QSOs with each other as the train enters each new county. The purpose is to rack up a big score without much effort.

Captive Stations – Radios operated by passengers in a vehicle that travels a preplanned route for the purpose of entering many new counties where the passengers make QSOs with each other. The purpose is to rack up a big score without much effort.

❖ What is ADIF? Why is it important to Frank?

ADIF is the acronym for Amateur Data Interface Format.

ADIF is found in ham radio PC applications where it is used to easily move data from one log book to another. You can EXPORT ADIF from your at-home log and Frank can IMPORT ADIF into the club's Special Event log.

ADIF is a recognized standard honored by Contest Logging apps (e.g. N3FJP, N1MM+, DX Labs Suite), Logbook Apps (e.g. QRZ.com, eQSL.cc, ARRL LOTW, ClubLog) and some Contest Sponsors (the Cabrillo standard is more commonly used by Contest Sponsors).

You can learn even more about ADIF by visiting and reading what you see at www.ADIF.org Or, you could be bored to near-death and wake up hours later wondering "Where am I? and What just happened?"
